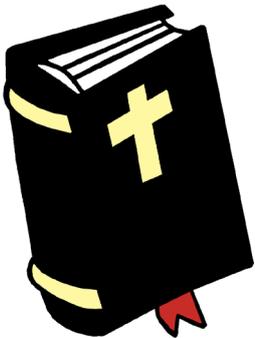


The City of Dothan



Dothan, a city north of Jerusalem, was first mentioned in the Bible in connection with the story of Joseph as the area where Jacob's sons had moved their flocks.

Joseph's older brothers were jealous of how their father, Jacob, doted on Joseph far more than them. As a young teen, Joseph was sent by his father to visit his brothers and see how they were doing while they watched over the sheep. Joseph's jealous brothers took advantage of the opportunity to sell Joseph as a slave to some Ishmaelite slave traders who were passing by on their way to Egypt.¹

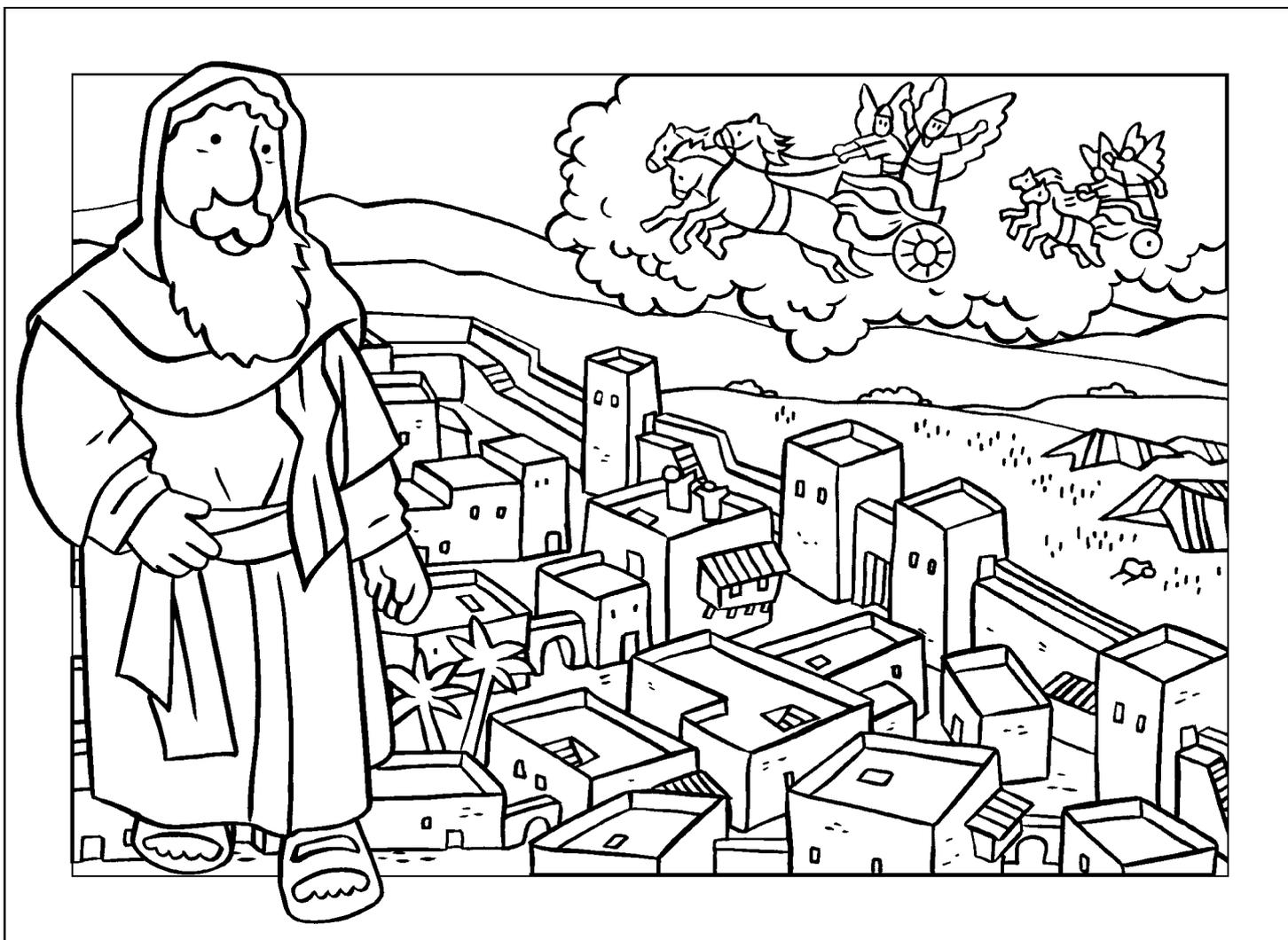
